Outline

■ Based on the decisions on the detailed rules for implementing Article 6 at COP27, establish thematic working groups (WG) of (1) authorization, (2) reporting, and (3) tracking, necessary for the implementation of Article 6, and provide supports for capacity building (CB) and institutional arrangement, mainly targeting government officials.



Activities

- Technical assistance on development of methodology


Private Sector






What can A6IP do to help build capacity in Article 6 Tracking?

Article 6 Implementation Partnership Center



- On April 27, 2023, MoE Japan established the "Article 6 Implementation Partnership(A6IP) Center", in response to the outcomes of 2023 G7 Climate, Energy and Environment Ministers' Meeting.
- As the secretariat promoting the activities of the A6IP, the Center aims to respond to the support needs of partners, provide relevant capacity-building support, and contribute to emission reductions and removals through the implementation of projects that leverage Article 6.

Activities of the Center

- Development of capacity-building tools for authorization, reporting, and tracking
- Development of tailored support packages responding to country needs
- Collection and dissemination of information on capacity-building support
- Management of the A6IP

Management Structure

- Institute for Global Environmental Strategies (IGES)
 will be responsible for managing the Center.
- The governing structure of the Center will be expanded in collaboration with UNFCCC secretariat and the World Bank.
